

Sunday marks time for us. On Sunday we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Yes, every Sunday of the year is like a little Easter. This is why the week starts and ends with Sunday, the first day at the head of the week and the eighth day at the end of the week. This is how Christians mark time. Modern Western culture may mark time with a five-day work week and a two-day weekend, but the Christian sense of time is that there is Sunday and the rest of the week. Sunday is the day for rest, for the redemption of time by "wasting" it with the Lord and those that God has put into our lives.

Sunday invites us into something more. This is the great insight which Jesus revealed to us: we are made for much more than even the best of what this world has to offer. We are made for eternal life with God. What utility can we give God in eternity? None. None at all. And the Day of the Lord, Sunday, invites us into this non-utility, this capacity to be rather than simply to do. How do we just be? The world in which we live pushes us to produce as much as possible, to be as useful as possible. And it alternately tells us to consume as much "experience" as possible. While productivity and experiences aren't bad in themselves, there something more to life, there's something more to the human experience than that.

Perhaps it could be a Lenten practice for you or your family this practicing how to be with God and with each other and slow down the frantic pace of life. Or maybe just for this Sunday. Either way, let's practice just being with the Lord today.

WHY SAYING "EVERYTHING HAPPENS FOR A REASON" DOESN'T HELP BY KELLIE GOFF

"We need to stop telling people that everything happens for a reason," my theology professor boldly said. He went "People use this phrase left and right, but do you even understand what you are saying to another person when these words leave your lips? Do you think about how this might sound to a friend of yours after they've confided with you that their parents are splitting up when you say this to someone whose family has been affected by hur ricanes, earthquakes, and all types of natural disasters? To a friend that has been sexually assaulted? To someone who suffers depression and anxiety? And what about those that live in thirdworld countries, young children born into such poverty? Will saying 'everything happens for a reason' just make all this pain go away? Whatever you, your friend, or your family member is personally fighting, you did not earn it. God does not inflict evil and suffering for an unknown reason. He is Love, so while He permits evil and will draw good from it, but He does not want bad things to happen for some arbitrary reason beyond our

While saying, "everything happens for a reason" is dismissive, trusting that God will bring new life from every death (literal or figurative) is something every Christian is called to do. So. How do we respond, then, when we see our friends or loved one's suffering?

At this Mass I took the opportunity to offer words of thanks to the members of the recently inaugurated Ministry of Consolation. The Ladies and Gentlemen of this ministry have provided a wonderful gift to our grieving families by acting as greeters, liturgical ministers, bakers, by creating memorial booklets for each individual funeral; in essence by being the face of Christ to our brothers and sisters in some of the saddest times they and their families have faced. I can't thank them enough for the support and care they have given and continue to give to our grieving families. Members are always needed to help in this ministry. You do not need to have any prior experience, but simply a desire to help. Now you may feel that you have nothing to offer or may feel that you are unable to walk with a grieving family, but actually you can still be part of this ministry. Help with producing the booklets, writing consolation cards for the families, or even baking a cake are integral parts to this ministry. If you are interested in participating, please contact Angela Manzi through the rectory office for more details.

This week marks what you might call the final countdown to our liturgical year. In a few short weeks we will celebrate the Feast of Christ the King of the Universe, which, by the way, will close the Year of Mercy. The following weekend, (Thanksgiving weekend), we will celebrate the first Sunday of Advent. As we move to the end of the year our readings take on a definitely more apocalyptic tone. This week our Gospel has the story of Jesus interaction with the Sadducees, who were the political and aristocratic elite of his time. They adopted Greek culture and customs while remaining Jewish. They also controlled the priesthood and the temple functions and often found themselves in direct opposition to the Pharisees, a group more closely associated with Jesus. In our gospel today they pose a question to Jesus. The Sadducees did not believe in a resurrection of the dead. They instead believed that when you died you went to Sheol, a place of nothingness. The Pharisees, however believed in a resurrection, though there was much disagreement in the state of the sadducees pose a trick question to Jesus about a way and the sadducees pose a trick property of the sadducees property of the marry her and raise up children in his memory. The story they tell goes on to say the woman married each of seven brothers in succession, each one dying and leaving no heirs, till finally the woman herself dies. (Honestly, I think she might have died of grief and exhaustion after so many husbands!). In the Jewish culture of Jesus day children were seen as a way of living on in the world. As long as you had children you were in a sense immortal, because they carried your blood forward. For the Sadducees there was no need for a resurrection if your blood line continued on. At the same time the Sadducees were mocking the idea of a bodily resurrection with a farfetched scenario. But there is a serious trap here couched in the funny plot they set up. If Jesus says the brothers should not marry the woman then he would be seen as denying the laws of Moses and not a good and faithful Jew and if he denies the bodily resurrection, then he pits himself against his own community, the Pharisees. Their plan backfires though. Jesus does neither, but instead points to the scriptures for the truth with an answer that silences them. He states that when God appears to Moses in the burning bush, a pivitoal point in the Jewish faith, he identifies himself as the God of their fathers – the same fathers from whom they all claim to share blood with. He notes that if God identifies himself as the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, then to God they are alive. They have not disappeared into nothingness but live on in his presence. He goes on to say that God is the God of the living not of the dead. If that is so, then so are all their descendents. What does this have to do with us? We belong to the God of the living, not of the dead. I think we need to be reminded of this.

This week we celebrated the saints, whose extraordinary lives we hold up as an example, and we remembered on All Souls Day our loved ones who have journeyed before us marked with faith. In a sense we are just as Jesus proclaimed in the gospel; we belong to the God of the living! We need to have hope and we need encouragement to continue on our pilgrim way. Jesus reassures us in this Gospel that there is still something more that God has in store for us. Though times may seem bleak, he wants us to

Will saying 'everything happens for a reason' just make all this pain go away? Whatever you, your friend, or your family member is personally fighting, you did not earn it. God does not inflict evil and suffering for an unknown reason. He is Love, so while He permits evil and will draw good from it, but He does not want bad things to happen for some arbitrary reason beyond our knowledge."

While saying, "everything happens for a reason" is dismissive, trusting that God will bring new life from every death (literal or figurative) is something every Christian is called to do. So. How do we respond, then, when we see our friends or loved one's suffering?


FOOD PANTRY

Welcome to the food bank.

A few ground rules:

- 1. Do not give anything you would not want to eat.
- 2. Don't give stupid things.
- 3. Consider giving food that can be eaten without cooking.
- 4. Don't give perishable items.
- 5. Think about people with special dietary needs.
- 6. Make it easy to get at.
- 7. Choose things that don't require elaborate preparation.
- 8. Keep it simple.

FOOD PANTRY

Feeding the hungry is one of the corporal works of mercy. This teaching of Jesus comes from the Gospel of Matthew 25:35 where, in a parable, Jesus says, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink."
